FRANFARE

Dear friends,

As I write this, I am preparing to leave for a trip to South Africa. Several people have asked me if this is a missionary trip; it is not. However it is a pilgrimage.

The concept of pilgrimage is an ancient one. I recall in high school reading the Canterbury Tales, which are cast as stories the pilgrims told one another as they traveled to worship before the relics of Thomas Becket at Canterbury Cathedral. I still remember learning the verses in Middle English –

*Whan that Aprille with his shoures sote
The droghte of Marche hath perced to the rote,
And bathed every veyne in swich licour
Of which vertu engendred is the flour; ...
Then longen folk to goon on pilgrimages.*



Wikipedia defines pilgrimage as “a journey or search of moral or spiritual significance.” Native Americans often go on “spirit quests.” Many Christians make a pilgrimage to the Holy Land at some point in their lives (St. John’s Lutheran, Sweat Air RD, is planning one for next year, information is available in the parish hall). Islam requires that, if it is possible, every Muslim makes the Hajj, a pilgrimage to Mecca, once in their lives. Walking the Camino de Santiago in Spain has become a popular route for modern day pilgrims seeking to find themselves or encounter God.

A pilgrimage has a goal, but not an agenda. The most important element is an openness to spiritual transformation. Pope Benedict XVI wrote, “To go on pilgrimage is not simply to visit a place to admire its treasures of nature, art or history. To go on pilgrimage really means to step out of ourselves in order to encounter God where he has revealed himself, where his grace has shone with particular splendor and produce rich fruits of conversion and holiness among those who believe.” Broadly considered, that means a pilgrimage have any place as its destination, provided the goal is seeking spiritual enlightenment.

I call my trip to South Africa a pilgrimage because that is my goal. Because you cannot get to South Africa directly, I decided to go through Paris, taking time to visit Notre Dame and San Chapelle in Paris, and Chartres Cathedral in a nearby town. Chartres is the location of an ancient labyrinth, laid into the floor of the cathedral. Labyrinths were tools used in the middle ages as a way of making pilgrimage for those unable to travel to the Holy Land or other significant site. Labyrinths have returned to popularity in modern times as a meditation tool, a means for taking a spiritual pilgrimage.

In South Africa I plan to visit several locations associated with apartheid and its dismantling. I will visit Robbin Island, where Nelson Mandela was imprisoned for many years, the Apartheid Museum, Soweto which produced two Nobel Peace Prize winners (Nelson Mandela and Anglican Archbishop Desmond Tutu) and hope also to visit the Cradle of Humankind near Johannesburg on the site of caves that contained pre-hominid remains.

I expect parts of this journey to be difficult, especially as I inevitably make connections between apartheid and the Jim Crow South in which I was raised. I also expect to be inspired by the will to overcome oppression and to create meaning and beauty that are part of God’s gift in the creation of humanity.

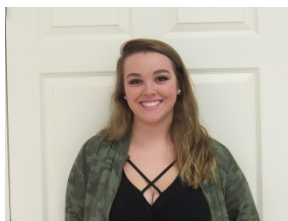

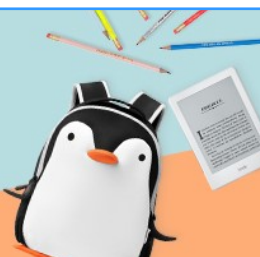

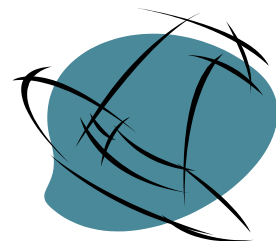

TAT - Tuesday at Trinity

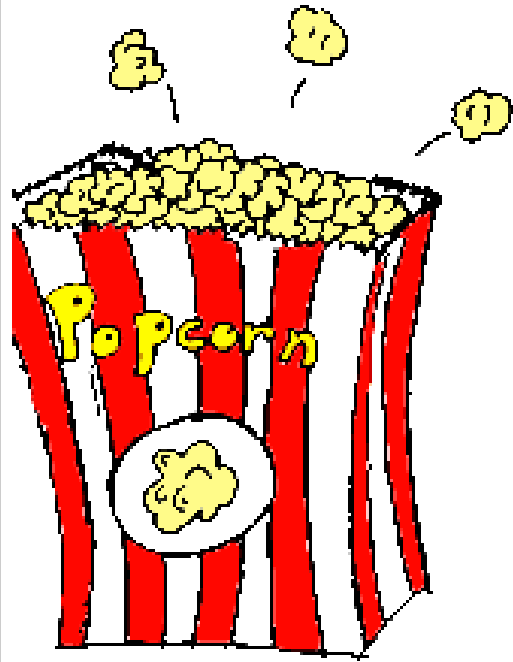
