### **BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION**



Trinity was authorized to form a congregation in the fall of 1819. Since Trinity Church was the congregation, the people, before it had a building, we can truthfully say we are 200 year old! We will celebrate our Bicentennial on May 3, 2020.

According to the history compiled by Robert Brockmann for the 185<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration, Edward Peerce and John Yellot led a fund drive to build what would become Trinity Church, Long Green, MD. One acre of land was donated by Edward Peerce, the building constructed in 1819 and 1820, and consecrated by the Rt. Rev. James Kemp, Bishop of the Diocese of Maryland. That first building was funded by contributions and all debts paid in 1826.

Trinity became an independent parish in 1862, sharing a rector with St. James, Monkton, and later with other parishes. The cemetery was organized in 1865-1866. In 1875, significant improvements were made to the building, including raising the ceiling and replacing plaster with paneling. What has been called the "Great Renovation of 1889" reversed the interior orientation 180°, the stained-glass window was installed behind the altar, and the exterior stone stuccoed. About 10 years later, the Gothic Revival style tower was added. Two further renovations were made, in 1934 and 1969, removing the heavy wood ornamentation, and creating a choir loft (where the organ speakers are today).

As it has been 50 years since the last renovation, it should come as no surprise that we have some work to do in order to prepare the church building for our Bicentennial Celebration. To that end, the vestry has authorized a series of repairs. These include: restoration and protection of our stained-glass windows (replacement cost - \$184,600), reroofing, replacement of deteriorating soffits, repairing flashings and cleaning the exterior stucco. The estimated total cost of all repairs will be approximately \$65,000. Thanks to a gift of \$10,000 after the September Trumpeter was published, we have \$22,319 in the Stained Glass Fund and memorials, and \$25,864 in the Capital Improvement Fund, for a total of \$48,183.

We have contracted with Epiphany Studios for the window refurbishment and protection project and are taking final bids for the roofing and exterior repairs. Please help us fund the balance by contributing to either fund as soon as possible. We want Trinity at her best for our celebration in May of 2020.

### Dear Friends,

Every fall I look forward to St. Francis Day, October 4. The Blessing of the Animals that takes place on or near to Oct. 4 in honor of St. Francis is always a delight. When I remember the first time I attended such a blessing, with my dog Hershey, I can't help but smile. For this moment, this service, the church recognized the special bond between humans and animals, a bond I cherish.

Francis tried to live his life in accordance with of the teachings of Jesus, and came as close to accomplishing that goal as is humanly possible.

When St. Francis Day, and the Blessing of the Animals comes around each year, I am reminded of this interconnectedness of all creation. I rejoice at the special bond I have with my dog, Latte. I look eagerly for leaves to change colors. I enjoy the cooler air on my skin and the fruits of the harvest. I acknowledge all the ways that I am connected to the world in which I live.

I think the quote from Barbara Brown Taylor in the box illustrates what we do when we bless animals, when we acknowledge our interdependence with all creation – we open our hearts, we give of ourselves to another creature, and so we open our souls to the God who looked at each element of creation and pronounced it good.

### **SUNDAY SCHOOL**



Did you realize that Sunday Schools began in England in the 1780s to provide basic education to working children? In that distant past, poor children were forced to work to provide for basic needs of their families. Their work was often dangerous and poorly paid. Perhaps the

worst aspect of child labor was that the children didn't learn the basics of reading, writing and arithmetic. Unable to read or write, their opportunities for employment were limited for their entire lives. Sunday Schools were a way to address that deficit, providing children with a brighter future with classes on the fundamentals needed to get a better job as they grew older. In time, partially due to more universal education and child labor laws, Sunday School shifted to a time to educate children in the basic stories and principles of Christianity.

Unlike many smaller churches today, Trinity still offers Sunday School to children from pre-school thru primary grades. Mrs. Sue Berry has been leading the school for several years, assisted by many helpers from among the parents of children attending the classes. For the last three Sundays, only one family had a child or children in attendance, with a different family each Sunday.

Many things compete for the time and attention of children and their parents including Sunday sports. Sometimes parents are exhausted by the weekend or want to avoid the hassle of getting the kids ready for church. If the parents of Trinity's children make a commitment to get their children to class on a regular basis, they will discover their children growing in spiritual knowledge.

I hope that our church will be alive with children each and every Sunday. Children are more than the future of the church; they ARE the church. We promise every baptized child that we will do everything in our power to help them grow in faith and love of God. For Trinity that means offering Sunday School, and for parents that means getting your children there on a regular basis. With God's help we can each meet the challenge of that promise.




