Dear friends,

While on vacation this summer, I ran across these glorious sand sculptures in Lisbon, Portugal. I hope you can appreciate the fine craftmanship that went into these creations. I have included the text of the sign propped along the sea wall above these works of art.

Looking back on these photos, I could not help but think, as I had when I first encountered the works themselves, that the artist had spent an enormous amount of time and energy creating these two beasts. And yet, sooner or later, the water and waves would destroy them. Like the creatures they depict, these sculptures have a limited lifespan. Once might argue that creating something so ephemeral is a waste of time, energy and money.

And yet, is it?

Is any creation, any artistic endeavor a waste, no matter how short lived?

Since the first humans painted pictures on the walls of cave, since the first potter added a graceful curve or lip to a vessel created for daily use, since the first person put paint to canvas or whittled an animal out of a block of wood for no reason other than to create a bit of beauty, human beings have proclaimed that such works of art are worth every minute, every bit of effort that went into their creation.

Something in the human soul/spirit drives us to create, to make beauty, whether the object is utilitarian or frivolous. I believe that something reflects the image of God in which we were created. God created a host of life forms, and every last one of them has a limited existence. God cares for every element of that creation, no matter how ephemeral, just as the sand artist cared about his creations.

The sand artist's request seems appropriate – Please keep this world clean and safe for all.







BICENTENNIAL PREPARATIONS

Trinity was authorized as a congregation in the fall of 1819 and immediately began the process of raising funds for a building in which to worship. Edward Peerce donated an acre of land and a committee raised a grand total of \$1,745.37. The building was consecrated by Bishop James Kemp

of the Diocese of Maryland on October 12, 1820.

We have chosen Sunday, May 3 to celebrate our Bicentennial, splitting the difference between authorization and consecration. Bishop Eugene Sutton will join us for Eucharist at 4 p.m. that day. We will continue our celebration with a catered supper.

The time has arrived for us to begin repairs and preparations to our church building. As we have discussed in past issues of the Trumpeter and at the last Annual Meeting, there are several major maintenance/repair issues that we need

to address: the roof and soffits, the windows, and damage due to water both in the narthex and in the nave of the church. Vestry person Justin Milio and other vestry members have gathered bids on reroofing and repair of the soffits. Several members of the parish, including Bob Knight, Bill Wiley, Ernie Brandt and Russ Tagg have evaluated and addressed the dampness issue in the narthex with only partial success. With the new damage along the left side of the nave, the vestry reevaluated the water issue. The new damage is most likely due to water seeping into the building from the roof, gutters and flashings; this would be most likely be fixed by roof replacements and associated repairs. The water damage in the narthex may also be due to water leaking around the clear windows in the tower; these would be addressed when the roof and trim was replaced. The outside of the building should need only a wash to finish it off. Dr. Fran has contacted several stained-glass repair firms for evaluation and repair of the stained glass windows, and also covering them with clear glass to prevent further damage.

While it may have cost less than \$2000 to build Trinity in 1819-1820, this much needed maintenance will coast approximately \$65,000. The good news is that we already have \$33,841 in hand, \$8,823 in memorials and donations designated specifically for repair of the stained-glass windows, and the balance in donations to the Capital Improvement Fund. At its August meeting, the vestry decided to go ahead and contract the roofing repair and the stained-glass window repair while raising the balance of the funds needed from the congregation.

The vestry will make a presentation about this on September 8, at our parish picnic. In the meantime, feel free to share your questions with any vestry member or Dr. Fran.


